

CONIFERS

Northern White Cedar

Thuja occidentalis

Also known as arborvitae. Slow growing, commonly used as a landscaping tree; Tolerates a wide variety of soils, but doesn't like extremely wet or dry conditions.

DECIDUOUS TREES & SHRUBS

Common Lilac

Syringa vulgaris

Perhaps the most prolific shrub in Vermont. Can grow to 15-20 feet in height. A common sight along roads, at abandoned farms and almost everywhere in the state. Light purple blooms in late spring perfume the air with their wonderful scent. What more needs to be said?

Siberian Crabapple

Malus baccata

Very cold hardy. Fragrant white blossoms, followed by bright red or yellow fruits. Makes delicious jelly. Grows to 25-50'.

Black Elderberry

Sambucus canadensis

White clusters of flowers produce purple-black berries; good for jam, juice and wine. Great for attracting songbirds and other wildlife. Good for stabilizing streambanks; likes full sun. Grows to 6-12'.

Wild Black Cherry

Prunus serotina

Fast growing, up to 60 feet; yellow to red leaves in the fall. Produces single white flowers in May, with black cherries in August. Used by over 54 species of birds, also bear, raccoon, deer, squirrel, and rabbit. Prized for furniture making and excellent for firewood. Prefers rich, deep moist soil.

American Plum

Prunus Americana

Ornamental landscape tree with clusters of 3/4-1" extremely fragrant white blossoms. The 1" red to purple fruit are quite edible and can be used for jellies. They provide food and excellent habitat for wildlife. Grows to 10-12'.

Serviceberry

Amelanchier canadensis

Also known as shadbush or juneberry. Small tree that will reach 15-35 feet tall. Often found as understory in the forest. Produces clusters of small fruits favored by deer, thrushes and other songbirds. Flowers early in the spring.

BLUEBERRIES

Three delicious varieties*, all hardy in northern Vermont. Container grown plants, 10-18" tall. Blueberries prefer full sun and acidic soil (add powdered sulphur if needed). Easy to pick and freeze.

- ◆ **Blue Gold** - Mid season. Mature plants will yield 12 lbs of fruit each. Easily pickable large clusters. 4-5' tall.
- ◆ **Blue Jay** - Early season. Medium-large berries with a mild flavor. Mature plants will yield 10-20 lbs each. 5-7' tall.
- ◆ **Northland** - Mid season. Small dark blue berries. Mature plants will yield 15-20 lbs each. 3-4' tall.


* For best pollination, order at least two varieties.

RASPBERRIES (Container grown)

Heritage - Medium, good flavor berries; ripens late August.

Caroline - The tastiest of all raspberries; Medium-large berries. ready mid August.

Canby - Early ripening; good quality fruit; ready in early July.



All trees and shrubs will come as **bare root**. You should be prepared to plant them within a few days of pickup. Until then, store them in a **cool shaded spot**, such as a garage, and keep the roots moist. After planting, **keep them watered regularly through the summer**.
